

Positron emission tomography (PET) is a non-invasive imaging technique mostly used in cancerology for diagnosis and response therapy assessment. Fluorine-18 (¹⁸F) is the ideal positron emitter due to its physical properties and its ease of production. In the era of the personalized medicine, there is a need for targeted radiotracers and therefore, a mild and late stage radiolabeling method applicable to biomolecules. Indeed, conventional method based on covalent carbon-¹⁸F bond formation requires drastic conditions that are not compatible with the stability of sensitive vector such as biomolecules. Over the last decade, an alternative radiofluorination has been explored: it consists of forming an aluminium-fluoride species {AI-¹⁸F} which is captured by a chelating agent^(a) (cf. Figure). This strategy was applied to access a wide range of ¹⁸F-labeled peptide for PET imaging in cancerology^(b). However, the reported radiosynthesis relied on a classical optimization approach of the radiochemical yield (RCY) by using one-factor-at-a-time method. For a better radiation protection and a more accurate model, an efficient optimization approach based on a Design of Experiments (DoE) method with Ellistat[®] software (v6.8) will be presented herein.
